Message from the Vicar of the Cathedral

My dear Friends in Christ, Greetings to you in the name of Jesus Christ our Saviour!

Nation: The recently concluded Presidential Election to elect the 7th Executive President of Sri Lanka has seen H.E Gotabaya Rajapaksa emerge as the winner. This election will be remembered in history as one of most peaceful elections in this country. We commend all those responsible for working tirelessly to ensure this was possible.

In order to secure a stable government speculation is strong that the new President will dissolve Parliament in order that a General Election will be called for in the not so distant future. It is hoped that the state machinery that ensured a free and fair Presidential Election in November 2019 will be able to do the same with the next General Election when it is scheduled in 2020.

Church: After the celebration of the Feast of the Nativity or the Incarnation also called Christmas, the next key Liturgical celebration will be the Epiphany on the 6^{th} January 2020. Here the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles is observed. This is something of significance to everyone who is not a Jew. This therefore, is a festival of significance to all of us.

Life in the Cathedral:

Christmas at the Cathedral – Outreach Project: The Christmas Outreach project of the Sunday school was a wonderful experience for all the children. Going to Thalawa in person was also a very moving experience for the children who made the journey. I am grateful to our children, the teachers, parents and members of the congregation for their wholehearted support so that the effort of the children resulted in something meaningful for the children at the House of Joy and our own Sunday school.

Cathedral Staff – Sexton: Our Sexton Suraj, has given us notice of his intention to leave. After engaging with Suraj in a conversation it was decided to accede to his request. Suraj will leave in early January. We wish him well.

I welcome to the Cathedral staff with effect from January 2020 Vethanayagam Robinson who will move into residence on the premises with his wife Nadeera. While we welcome them into the Cathedral family I request you to receive them with love and respect as they settle down and Robinson learns the work that is expected of him.

Personal - Overseas Travel: In the latter part of November and early December I had the opportunity of participating in a conference on Evangelism Missional Witness and a training programme of Diakonia and Development. These were jointly organized by the World Council of Churches and the Christian Conference of Asia and held in Chiang Mai, Thailand.

The conference helped reiterate an important truth that we in Church must not lose sight that we, as the people of God have a biblical mandate to proclaim the good news of the gospel. I also had the privilege of presenting a paper at this conference on the theme **Evangelism and Missional Witness: Specific Situations in Countries and Regions.**

The training programme helped us reiterate the truth that the Church while participating in Diakonia and Development does not conclude its mission simply by only empowering people. The Church is called to go beyond empowerment in order to ensure transformation in the lives of human beings. At this conference I had the responsibility of leading the biblical reflection that presented the basis for Diakonia and Development.

The annual carol service by the Choir of the Cathedral, a Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, is not just eagerly awaited by the Cathedral congregation but by a larger audience, Christians and non-Christians alike, looking to usher in the season with this beautiful act of worship in preparation for Christmas.

It was 5.30 p.m. on the evening of Sunday, December 8th when the choir dressed in their white cassocks assembled to a Cathedral already full of people, many of whom had come in early to ensure a good seat. Into the fading evening light came the voices of Rachel Brohier and Dilsarah Derrick singing 'Breath of Heaven' as a duet.



The service began in time-honoured fashion – the first verse of 'Once in Royal David's City', a solo, sung so sweetly by young soprano Sashyani Rodrigo. As the choir made their way in solemn procession down the aisle, the congregation joined in, the poignant words of this carol by Mrs. C.F. Alexander bringing home that scene in the stable at Bethlehem.

The service was meaningful in every aspect: the Bidding Prayer which followed exhorted us 'to pray for the needs of the whole world; for peace on earth.... And remember in His name, the poor and helpless, the cold, the hungry, and the oppressed; the sick and them that mourn, the lonely and the unloved, the aged and the little children; all those who know not the Lord Jesus or who love Him not...." The origin of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols dates back to 1880 when the first Bishop of Truro in Cornwall, England, Rev. E. W. Benson held the first such service in this format in a wooden shed that served as the church while

Truro's cathedral was being built. It was later adapted for King's College, Cambridge by Dean Eric Milner and gained wide popularity, the King's College choir's carol service which is broadcast worldwide, marking a hundred years in

2018.

The Cathedral service had two local carols Sinhala and Tamil amongst the traditional ones. The choir sang the lilting and lively 'Deva Kumuaru and 'Athi Thum' Kalavil Palanai Thedi' with much



enthusiasm and the next carol Jesus Child (words and music by John Rutter) continued this joyful vein.

As always, the children's choir brought many fond smiles as they presented their contribution, 'The Angel's Carol' before the congregation joined in for 'In the Bleak Mid Winter' another Christmas classic that many wait to sing at Christmastime.

The choir chose an all-male arrangement by Asita Tennekoon of 'O Holy Night' with soloists Jason Senanayake and Srimanthaka Senanayake joining Choir Director Ishan de Lanerolle for this most loved carol. It was then time for 'The First Nowell' and 'Hark! The Herald Angels Sing' - two Christmas staples where the congregation joined in with gusto, followed by 'Adeste Fideles' (O Come All Ye

Faithful). The church lights dimmed as the choir sang the recessional carol 'Silent Night' making their way out in candlelight, symbolic of the light the Christ child brings to our hearts.

The readings, taken from both the Old and New Testaments were by members of the Cathedral community. At the organ was Blodwen Weeratunga with Neranjan de Silva, lending his expert touch for the duet



before the carol service and also for 'Jesus Child', 'The Nativity Song', 'The Angels Carol', 'O Holy Night', 'The First Nowell' and 'Hark The Herald'.

It was a wonderful start to the Christmas season, a carol service that lifted our hearts and sent us home strengthened with the words of the Collect for Christmas Day that was read at the service, a prayer "... that we, who have been born again and made your children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by your Holy Spirit."
